










HOSPITAL ADMISSIONS BY AGE OVER TIME


















Washington's case rate since Jan. 2020 is lower than almost every other state














Deaths per 100,000 since Jan. 2020

COVID-19 Vaccine Rollout in Washington State

Conceptually, vaccine rollout can be thought of as a three-legged stool: supply, logistics, and demand.

All three legs are necessary to be effective in balancing goals of getting as many Washingtonians vaccinated quickly and equitably. Any imbalance in the "legs" of the stool during different phases of vaccine rollout will lead to challenges in the ultimate goal of achieving adequate vaccine coverage across Washington.



Number of vaccine doses coming into state of Washington and then to local communities




Ability to administer vaccine doses when available in a timely and effective manner







Percentage of people initiating vaccination














Hospital admission rate by vaccination status in those 45 to 64

















- 100% demand-based allocation
- Dropped requirement for providers to use 95% of their COVID-19 vaccine inventory within 7 days










Myocarditis and Pericarditis UPDATE



- Small number of cases in some patients, post-vaccination
- Further investigation needed to see if they are connected to COVID-19 vaccines

























Goal of full reopening on or before June 30th

















New mask guidance

- Masks required for people who are not fully vaccinated
- Respect the `rules of the room'
- Masks required for all in some settings (for example: health care, schools)















Updated guidance for employers

- Fully vaccinated employees do not have to wear a mask or socially distance at work, unless their employer still requires it
- Before ending mask and social distance requirements, employers must confirm workers are fully vaccinated – by having the worker either sign a document attesting to their status or provide proof of vaccination
- Employers must be able to demonstrate they have verified vaccination status for workers who are not masked or physically distanced

New Overnight Summer Camp Guidance

- Masks required for staff and campers, with some exceptions
- Campers and staff must either be fully vaccinated or have a negative COVID test no more than three days prior to arrival
- Campers should sleep at least six feet apart
