











#### Covid-19 hospitalizations in Washington




# $R_e$ estimate (Goal < 1.0)

# Projected daily deaths – United States


Daily deaths is the best indicator of the progression of the pandemic, although there is generally a 17-21 day lag between infection and deaths.









Total Percent Vaccinated by Race - American Indian or Alaskan Native






Total Percent Vaccinated by Race - Black




Total Percent Vaccinated by Race - Hispanic




#### Washington State Local Health Jurisdictions



# Vaccine Locator: children and youth services

Children and Youth Services ^

Provide vaccines to children, ages 5-11

Provide vaccines to youth, ages 12-17

Consent allowed from a foster parent or other person authorized by a court to provide consent to medical care for a child in an out-of-home placement

Consent allowed from a person with signed authorization from parent to make health care decisions

Consent allowed from a relative responsible for health care

Consent allowed from school nurse, counselor, or homeless liaison (for a youth defined as homeless under the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act)

Consent allowed from youth who are legally emancipated or married to an adult

Consent allowed from youth qualifying under the Mature Minor Doctrine

Verbal consent allowed (over the phone)

Written consent allowed

Parent/Guardian/Authorized adult does not need to be physically present

### Addressing confidence

- Support community-led messaging and initiatives.
- Bring community leaders, influencers, experts, and primary audiences to the table
- Demonstrate responsiveness to community needs and concerns.



**Equity Gap:** the average difference in % of population initiating vaccination in high vs low SVI census tracts






# How data can be used to prioritize health equity:

# Agency request proposal summary



- 2 Agency Request Bills
- 5 General Fund State Decision Packages
  - Total \$28.7 million GFS
- 7 ARPA Decision Packages
  - Total \$364 million ARPA
- 7 "Other" Fund Decision Packages
  - Total \$7.4 million Operating Budget
  - Total \$20.4 million Capital Budget
- 5 Maintenance Level Decision Packages
  - Total \$7 million

# Agency request bills

Enhance Capacity and Diversity of Health Profession Boards and Commissions

Modifies statutes to achieve consistency, allow for more diversity, and increase effectiveness of these boards and commission by:

- expanding the size of membership and number of public members,
- removing membership restrictions, modifying quorum requirements and increasing compensation so all boards and commissions are reimbursed at a Class 5 rate (\$250 a day)
- Allowing EMTs to Provide Communicable Disease Testing and Vaccines

Allows EMTs to provide testing and vaccines for communicable diseases outside of an emergency in collaboration with local, regional, or state public health agencies.

# General Fund State (GFS) decision packages

- Young Adult Behavioral Health, \$17.8 million
- Sustain Child Profile Health System, \$1 million
- Prevent Child Lead Exposure, \$409,000
- Increase Sunrise Review Capacity, \$198,000
- Food Insecurity And Equity, \$6.2 million

# American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

- Approximately \$800 million discretionary ARPA available
- Competition with other state agencies for these funds
- Decision Packages
  - Continue COVID-19 Vaccinations, \$125 million
  - Improve Credentialing Performance, \$2.5 million
  - Behavioral Health Response and Recovery, \$3.9 million
  - Climate Change Surveillance and Resiliency Program, \$3.5 million
  - Contain the Spread, \$212 million
  - Washington Medical Coordination Center, \$1.2 million
  - Maintain Core Public Health Systems, \$15.9 million, \$3.1 million GFS

# "Other" fund decision packages


- Upgrade Drinking Water System, \$1.0 million Safe Drinking Water Account
- Address Drinking Water Backlog, \$3.5 million Drinking Water Assistance Account
- Upgrade Medical Cannabis Registry, \$2.1 million Dedicated Marijuana Account
- Cannabis Laboratory Testing, \$818,000 Dedicated Marijuana Account
- Improve Critical Water Infrastructure, \$20 million Drinking Water Assistance Account
- Increase DWSRF Preconstruction Loans, \$400,000 Drinking Water Assistance Account

# Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (H.R. 3684)

#### \$1.2 trillion, includes \$550 billion in new investments

#### **PROCESS**

- August 10, 2021, passed the Senate with a 69-30 vote
- November 5, 2021, passed the House with a 228-206 vote
- President to sign in matter of days
