X 2. AMEND RULE - I am requesting the agency to change an existing rule.

List rule number (WAC), if known: WAC 246-100-036

X	I am requesting the following change:	WAC 246-100-036 should be amended to require the Local Health Officer to obtain the approval of the local board of health before instituting any disease control measure that deviates from the disease control measures instituted by the Washington State Health Department.
\boxtimes	This change is needed because:	The current rule allows for a single appointed Local Health Officer to act unilaterally without consultation from a broader and more diverse group of health professionals and elected officials who are accountable to the broader community and other stakeholders. The current rule was made prior to the COVID-19 pandemic was not intended to convey the types of broad powers currently being used (and likely used in the future) by a single Local Health Officer.
\mathbf{X}	The effect of this rule change will be:	To create accountability and prevent abuse of power by a single individual by requiring input from a variety of experienced health care professionals and elected officials before instituting disease control measures that differ from the State Health Department's measures. This is incredibly important especially in larger counties where such measures can and do affect the lives of millions of people and businesses.
		Each county in Washington has its own Board of Health that is responsible for setting county-wide public health policy, enact and enforce local public health regulations. These duties, which are enumerated in RCW 70.05.060, include enforcing state public health statutes, and preventing and controlling the spread of infectious disease. Why should an administrative code rule be allowed to take that power away from the boards of health and put it in the hands of a single unelected individual (the "Local Health Officer")?
