



Quarterly Community Update

RECENT HAPPENINGS

The Board met in January and March.

In January (<u>watch the recording</u>) highlights included welcoming a new Board Member, <u>Peter Browning</u>, and a new staff policy advisor, <u>Ashley (Ash) Noble</u>.

Among other things, the Board:

- Invited partners from the Department of Health (Department),
 Washington State Association of Local Public Health Officials, and
 the American Indian Health Commission to share their priorities for
 the Legislative Session
- Adopted a motion directing Board staff to <u>initiate rulemaking for</u>
 <u>WAC 246-290-315</u>, to continue to clearly maintain the drinking
 water state action levels (SALs) and associated requirements until
 the federal standards are effective, or the Board completes its
 revision of the permanent rule
- Received updates on various rulemaking work including Auditory Screening, Newborn Screening, and the School Rule Project.

In March, (watch the recording) among other things, the Board:

- Received an update from the <u>Tacoma Pierce County Public</u> <u>Health Department</u>.
- Reviewed and approved <u>recommendations</u> from the Newborn Screening Technical Advisory Committee to update the Newborn Screening Process.
- Received updates on the <u>Shellfish rulemaking project</u> and the <u>School Rule project</u>.
- Discussed the process and timeline for the 2026 State Health Report.
- Welcomed communications consultant, <u>Marcus DeHart</u> and administrative assistant, <u>Crystal Ogle</u> to Board staff positions.

WITH APPRECIATION

The Board is <u>grateful to Member Dimyana Abdelmalek</u> for her service. She has served on the Board since 2022 as a Local Health Officer representative, and has been the Chair of the Board's Health Promotion subcommittee. SANITARY CONTROL OF SHELLFISH

The Board is considering changes to Chapter 246-282 WAC. This chapter helps ensure shellfish are safe to eat. These rules explain how to grow, harvest, process, and sell shellfish. The Board recently held Rules Advisory Committee meetings with shellfish partners. At these meetings, we reviewed draft rule language and gathered feedback. Now the Board is updating the draft based on feedback. Next, the Board will host an informal comment period with the entire shellfish industry and the public. NEWBORN SCREENING UPDATE

The Board is responsible for creating rules to screen babies born in Washington for certain health conditions. The Board has set up a Newborn Screening Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) which <u>recommended</u> updating how the state decides which conditions are added to the screening panel. At the Board's meeting on March 12, they reviewed the TAC's recommendations on how to evaluate conditions for the newborn screening panel.

The Board also considered the TAC's review of <u>branched chain ketoacid</u> <u>dehydrogenase kinase deficiency</u>, where the TAC recommended to not include this condition in the mandatory screening panel.

The TAC will <u>meet virtually on March 26</u> to finish reviewing congenital cytomegalovirus and vote on whether to recommend adding it to the newborn screening panel. Additional conditions the Board plans to review include Wilson's Disease, 3MCC, Krabbe Disease, Hunter syndrome (MPS-II), and congenital hearing loss.

PEAR PLAN

The Board has its <u>first Pro-Equity Anti-Racism Strategic Action Plan</u> in place. The plan is often called the PEAR plan. The PEAR plan aims to remove barriers to participation in government activities. State agencies identified areas that could improve outcomes for Washingtonians. The Board's internal PEAR team has looked at gaps and opportunities in Board practices. Staff were able to share the plan with representatives of community-based organizations for feedback. The Board views the plan as the foundation for equity work. This plan highlights the importance that our community members have in policy development.

The Board's plan focuses on three key areas.

- Create avenues for communities to participate and inform Board activities
- Build relationships with Tribes, community-based organizations, and Washingtonians
- Ensure hiring and professional development activities increase Board and Board staff understanding of equity and anti-racism principles

COUNCIL OPENING

<u>Apply to serve</u> on the <u>Governor's</u> <u>Interagency Council on Health</u> <u>Disparities</u>.

The vacancy is for a member of the public who does not have financial ties to the healthcare industry. This position is appointed by the Governor and serves a three-year term, with the possibility of reappointment.



SCHOOL RULE PROJECT

The <u>School Environmental Health and Safety Rule Project</u> team held additional listening sessions throughout the state. The goal of these sessions was to hear from Washington families, students, and school staff about concerns they have for school environmental health and safety. The team held these additional sessions in Tri-Cities, Auburn, and online. The comments from the sessions and the informal comment period have been summarized and presented to the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC).

The committee has met five times this year to finalize language, prioritize topics, and review informal comments for the draft proposed rule **WAC 246-370**. They met once more in March to review the fiscal analysis. The committee will meet with the Board on April 9, 2025, to discuss the draft rule.
